



Rapid COVID-19 Screening Tests at UBC Orchard Commons

The UBC School of Nursing is taking a lead in delivering and evaluating a pilot project to provide rapid COVID-19 screening tests at UBC. Students and staff who live or work in first-year residence (Orchard Commons and hamlesem House in Totem Park) are eligible to participate in this project between February 9 and April 8, 2021.

This voluntary initiative is a collaboration between the Federal and Provincial Governments, Providence Health Care, Vancouver Coastal Health, UBC's School of Nursing, Safety & Risk Services, and Student Housing and Community Services.



"In addition to screening first year residents, UBC nursing students are learning about program planning and delivering a pop-up health screening program," says <u>Professor Elsie Tan</u>.

As COVID-19 continues to spread, there is growing concern about its impact in low-and middle-income countries like Pakistan where the impact could be extreme given its fragile economy, limited healthcare resources, widespread poverty, gender inequality, and poor health outcomes.


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CIHR Project Funding

The Priority Announcement funding for early career researcher-led Patient-Oriented Research will help launch development of a mobile app to reduce social isolation, support person-centred care, and continuity of care when moving between hospitals and care homes.

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Healthy Starts Catalyst Grant

Congratulations to UBC Nursing assistant professor, <u>Dr. Manon Ranger</u>, for two funded

Health Starts Catalyst Grants from BC Children's Hospital Research Institute.

The award provides \$40,000 towards the project, The role of neuroinflammation in early life pain/sucrose-induced neurodevelopment impairments, which was ranked first in the competition.

Dr. Ranger is also a co-applicant on the second ranked project, Brain-to-brain synchrony in mother-child and father-child dyads: a novel partnering with CPCSSN with both parties biomarker of brain development (\$40,000), with NPI Dr. Guy Dumont (UBC Engineering).


PHAC Partnership Announced

Given the clear synergies, the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) is pleased to be looking forward to a long-term partnership.

The initial support was to assess the utility of de-identified electronic medical record data from CPCSSN for COVID-19 surveillance and tracking unintended consequences of the pandemic among Canadians receiving primary care.

The UBC Capacity Unit released the first findings from the STRENGTH study, a three-year community-based, participatory outreach pilot project with women living in the Downtown Eastside (DTES).

Co-lead by <u>Dr. Vicky Bungay</u> and Linda Dewar, the STRENGTH approach was to build trust in one-to-one relationships, meeting women where they are at, build on their strengths and focus on needs they identified to support better access to and receipt of services.
